There is one AWP located to the rear of the trade area. There is no trade kitchen. Emergency lighting is installed and operational, emergency exits are indicated by illuminated signs, fire fighting equipment is installed and regularly serviced. The electrical installation is certified.

Following an assessment of the premises and its surrounding area the following is proposed:

30 minute drinking up time will allow appropriate dispersal, use of lavatories etc.

In order to further the licensing objectives the licensee reserves the right to move the fire appliances. AWP machines, cigarette machines and/or any other similar objects temporarily in a fixed location, which may impact on the ability of individuals on the premises to use exits or escape routes without impediment.

The Prevention of Crime & Disorder:

Most customers are local.

We operate a zero tolerance policy to drugs and the users of drugs. Staff are required to provide proof of age if in doubt.

Public Safety:

Emergency lighting is installed and operational, emergency exits are indicated by illuminated signs.

The electrical installation is certified.

Fire fighting equipment is installed and operational, emergency exits are indicated by illuminated signs.

Staff are aware of the needs of disabled customers and offer assistance when required.

The Prevention of Public Nuisance:

Customers are requested to leave quietly and respect local residents.

Windows remain closed when music is played and all windows are double glazed.

The Protection of Children from Harm:

No children are permitted in the premises.

Children are permitted if accompanied in the beer garden.

Nudity or partial nudity are not permitted at any time.

It is considered that the following policies are relevant to this application:

Statement of Licensing Policy

8.0 Prevention of Public Nuisance

- 8.3 The Council may require applicants for premises licences to provide documented noise assessments with a view to minimising noise nuisance.
- 8.4 Noise from amplified music is a common source of disturbance. In order to minimise the impact in the vicinity, the licensing authority

- may require a range of measures to be taken. These may include the installation of soundproofing, air conditioning, acoustic and sound limitation devices.
- 8.5 In premises where regulated entertainment is provided, the licensing authority will require a documented noise assessment for the premises, which must indicate whether there is likely to be any nuisance or disturbance to the local community, and if so, what measures are to be implemented to prevent this.
- 8.6 The licensing authority may at its discretion waive the requirement for a noise assessment where it can be demonstrated that the nature, type or location of the premises is such that the likelihood of nuisance arising is negligible.

Secretary of State's Guidance

Prevention of Nuisance

- 7.41 Conditions relating to noise nuisance will normally concern steps necessary to control the levels of noise emanating from premises, from simple mechanisms like ensuring that doors and windows are kept closed after a particular time in the evening to more sophisticated mechanisms like sound level inhibitors on amplification equipment or sound proofing. Any conditions necessary to promote the prevention of public nuisance should be tailored to the style and characteristics of premises and the type of activities expected to take place there.
- 7.42 As with all conditions, it will be clear that conditions relating to noise nuisance may in certain circumstances not be necessary where the provisions of the Environmental Protection Act 1990 and of the Noise Act 1996 adequately protect those living in the vicinity of the premises in question. But as stated earlier in this Guidance, the approach of licensing authorities and responsible authorities should be one of prevention and when their powers are engaged, licensing authorities should be aware of the fact that other legislation may not adequately cover concerns raised in relevant representations and additional conditions may be necessary.
- 7.43 Where applications have given rise to representations, any necessary and appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. For example, music noise from premises usually occurs from mid-evening until either late evening or early morning when residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise may also prove necessary to address any

disturbance anticipated as customers enter and leave the premises and therefore, in the immediate vicinity of the premises.

1.7. Officer's Report

Representations received from the police, environmental health officer and residents refer in the main to noise from music and social disturbance, although residents also have concerns in respect of anti-social behaviour.

Restrictions and conditions are proposed by the police and environmental health officer and then should be considered along with any other appropriate measures, following personal representations and the submissions of the applicant.

2.6. Policy Considerations

It is considered that the following policies are relevant to this application:

6.0 Crime & Disorder

- 6.6 In addition to the requirements that the Council promote the licensing objectives, it also has a duty under Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 to do all it reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder in the County Borough. The council is required therefore to have particular regard to the likely impact of licensing on crime and disorder. The nature or type of premises, its location, the hours of operation, its impact on the area, the operation and management of premises are all significant factors, which can impact on crime and disorder. All applications for licences or certificates including renewals and variations will be expected to have addressed these matters within the operating schedule.
- 6.9 In order to ensure the safety of patrons and other persons in the vicinity of the premises, the council suggests that operating schedules give consideration to the following measures and may require any or all of these measures to be implemented in the interests of minimising crime and disorder.

(ii) CCTV

The provision of CCTV is a very useful tool in monitoring premises to assist in ensuring the safety of patrons and preventing crime and disorder. The council may specify that a suitable system approved by the police and council, covering the interior and exterior of the premises, is installed. This should be properly maintained and fully operational whilst the premises are open. The areas to be covered should normally be entrances, both external and internal and any part of the premises not routinely under visual

supervision including beer gardens. CCTV tapes should be kept for twenty-eight days and made available to the police and local authority officers at any time.

8.0 Prevention of Public Nuisance

- 8.3 The Council may require applicants for premises licences to provide documented noise assessments with a view to minimising noise nuisance.
- 8.4 Noise from amplified music is a common source of disturbance. In order to minimise the impact in the vicinity, the licensing authority may require a range of measures to be taken. These may include the installation of soundproofing, air conditioning, acoustic and sound limitation devices.
- 8.5 In premises where regulated entertainment is provided, the licensing authority will require a documented noise assessment for the premises, which must indicate whether there is likely to be any nuisance or disturbance to the local community, and if so, what measures are to be implemented to prevent this.
- 8.6 The licensing authority may at its discretion waive the requirement for a noise assessment where it can be demonstrated that the nature, type or location of the premises is such that the likelihood of nuisance arising is negligible.

10. Licensing Hours

10.6 Shops, stores and supermarkets will generally be permitted to sell alcohol, whilst the retail outlet is open for business. However, where there are good reasons for restricting the hours, e.g. where they are the focus of disorder and disturbance, then following police representations, a limitation of hours will be considered.

Secretary of State's Guidance

Hours of Trading

6.2 It is recommended that shops, stores and supermarkets selling alcohol should generally be permitted to match the hours during which they may sell alcohol with their normal trading hours during which other sales take place, unless there are exceptional reasons relating to the licensing objectives, in particular the prevention of crime and disorder and public nuisance. Accordingly, if the law permits the shop to open for 24 hours or limits such opening, for example, on Sundays, the licensing authority should generally permit the sale of alcohol

during those hours unless there are very good reasons as to why it is necessary not to do so.

6.3 Some shops may however be known to be a focus for disturbance because youths congregate there and engage in nuisance and anti-social behaviour, including trying to pressurise shop staff to make unlawful sales of alcohol. Where relevant representations are made by an interested party or a responsible authority (particularly, the police) concerning applications for premises licences for such places, or in connection with existing licences, licensing authorities should consider a restriction on opening hours as one mechanism of combating such problems if this would be necessary.

Prevention of Nuisance

7.43 Where applications have given rise to representations, any necessary and appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. For example, music noise from premises usually occurs from mid-evening until either late evening or early morning when residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise may also prove necessary to address any disturbance anticipated as customers enter and leave the premises and therefore, in the immediate vicinity of the premises.

2.7. Officer's Report

Representations from the police relate to nuisance from social disturbance, and also suggest some measures to deal with public safety and crime and disorder.

A resident expresses concern at the hours sought and also submit that there is an existing problem in the area with persons frequenting the premises.

These issues should be considered after hearing any personal representations, and or submissions made by the applicant.

2.8. Recommendation

That members determine the application after taking into account the representations received.

11.0 Integration

11.5 The Council acknowledges that there must be proper separation of the planning, building control and licensing functions and that licensing applications will not be a re-run of the planning application.

Secretary of State's Guidance

- 3.51 A statement should also indicate:
 - that planning, building control and licensing regimes will be properly separated to avoid duplication and inefficiency. Applications for premises licences for permanent commercial premises should normally be from businesses with planning consent for the property concerned. Licensing applications should not be a re-run of the planning application and should not cut across decisions taken by the local authority planning committee or following appeals against decisions taken by that committee. Similarly, the granting by the licensing committee of any variation of a licence which involves a material alteration to a building would not relieve the applicant of the need to apply for planning permission or building control where appropriate. Proper integration should be assured by licensing committees, where appropriate, providing regular reports to the planning committee on the situation regarding licensed premises in the area, including the general impact of alcohol related crime and disorder. 3.6. Officer's Report

The police representations relate to concerns in respect of crime and disorder in view of the existing situation in Station Road. They also recommend various measures to address some of the issues raised e.g. provisions of CCTV.

The Environmental Health Officer refers to nuisance to residents in flats in the vicinity of the premises and recommends no increase in operating hours.

The planning officer advises that operating hours are restricted under the planning consent in the interests of amenity.

These matters need to be considered along with any submissions made by the applicant.

4.6. Policy Considerations

It is considered that the following policies are relevant to this application:

6.0 Crime & Disorder

- 6.6 In addition to the requirements that the Council promote the licensing objectives, it also has a duty under Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 to do all it reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder in the County Borough. The council is required therefore to have particular regard to the likely impact of licensing on crime and disorder. The nature or type of premises, its location, the hours of operation, its impact on the area, the operation and management of premises are all significant factors, which can impact on crime and disorder. All applications for licences or certificates including renewals and variations will be expected to have addressed these matters within the operating schedule.
- 6.9 The Council considers that certain types of premises are likely to require additional measures or conditions due to the nature, type and mode of operation. These would include premises, which sell alcohol and cater mainly for the 16-25 age group and provide

regulated entertainment, or premises which provide events or entertainment mainly for children.

In order to ensure the safety of patrons and other persons in the vicinity of the premises, the council suggests that operating schedules give consideration to the following measures and may

require any or all of these measures to be implemented in the interests of minimising crime and disorder.

(i) Door Supervisors

The need for door supervisors is normally a matter, which is considered and determined by the applicant within the operating schedule. However, where an applicant has made no provision for providing door supervisors, but it is considered that they are essential to meet the crime and disorder or public safety objective the council may specify that the premises must provide registered door supervisors. The council may also require a duty log / register of door supervisors be kept for the premises. Where door supervisors are provided they must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority. Generally one door supervisor per 100 persons would be required to be present on the premises. However, additional supervisors may be necessary in certain situation, e.g. where there is a significant number of very young persons, or where there is a potential for boisterous or excitable behaviour, e.g. stag nights; football matches; celebrity visits. Applicants are advised to give consideration to these matters within the operating schedule as well as the days and hours of operation of the door supervisors.

(ii) CCTV

The provision of CCTV is a very useful tool in monitoring premises to assist in ensuring the safety of patrons and preventing crime and disorder. The council may specify that a suitable system approved by the police and council, covering the interior and exterior of the premises, is installed. This should be properly maintained and fully operational whilst the premises are open. The areas to be covered should normally be entrances, both external and internal and any part of the premises not routinely under visual supervision including beer gardens. CCTV tapes should be kept for twenty-eight days and made available to the police and local authority officers at any time.

(iii) Glasses/Bottles

Applicants should, where appropriate be able to demonstrate that they have adequate procedures in place to prevent glasses and bottles being brought into or out of the premises, and there is provision for regular collection of glasses and bottles. The use of toughened drinking vessels and plastic bottles should be considered. Where the consumption of alcohol is likely to be in the

open air, e.g. in beer gardens or outside events, toughened or plastic vessels should be used.

(iv) Drugs

Applicants are expected to be able to demonstrate that they can comply with Home Office Guidance "Safer Clubbing" and have an agreed protocol with the council and the police for dealing with illegal drugs found on their premises. Matters likely to be required may include: - condition of entry to all premises, drugs amnesty boxes, CCTV coverage, log of all seizures, stop and search policy, and the availability of free water.

- 8.3 The Council may require applicants for premises licences to provide documented noise assessments with a view to minimising noise nuisance.
- 8.4 Noise from amplified music is a common source of disturbance. In order to minimise the impact in the vicinity, the licensing authority may require a range of measures to be taken. These may include the installation of soundproofing, air conditioning, acoustic and sound limitation devices.

For example, music noise from premises usually occurs from mid-evening until either late evening or early morning when residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise may also prove necessary to address any disturbance anticipated as customers enter and leave the premises and therefore, in the immediate vicinity of the premises.

4.7. Officer's Report

The police representations relate to the crime and disorder objective based on the situation presently existing in the area. Various crime and disorder and safety requirements are proposed.

The environmental health officer recommends that existing times are maintained to prevent nuisance to residents living in the area.

These matters should be considered in the light of any submissions made by the applicant.

4.8. Recommendation

That members determine the application after taking into account the representations received.

The premises has a well documented Management and Staff Policy. All Staff are fully conversant with the Premises Operating Policies, compliance of which is a condition of employment.

The Prevention of Crime & Disorder:

The Premises has CCTV coverage consisting of 31 cameras, with a 30 day retention of images by way of multiplex colour and B/W video hard disc drive system.

The Premises comprehensive drugs policy, with staff training on the identification of common controlled drugs, symptoms of drug use and indications of drug misuse and residue.

As part of the policy, staff are instructed to carry out regular checks of all public areas including toilets (and external drinking areas).

Any door supervisors employed at the premises, must be registered by the Security Industry Authority.

The premises has transport policy and a local Taxi Company is recommended for use by customers.

The resident states that he is presently being disturbed and thus objects to any further extension of operating hours.

These issues should be considered after hearing all personal representations and any submissions from the applicant.
