But as stated earlier in this Guidance, the approach of licensing authorities and responsible authorities should be one of prevention and when their powers are engaged, licensing authorities should be aware of the fact that other legislation may not adequately cover concerns raised in relevant representations and additional conditions may be necessary.
- 7.43 Where applications have given rise to representations, any necessary and appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. For example, music noise from premises usually occurs from mid-evening until either late evening or early morning when residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise may also prove necessary to address any disturbance anticipated as customers enter and leave the premises and therefore, in the immediate vicinity of the premises.

1.8. Officer's Report

Representations relate to public nuisance this includes both noise from music, and also social disturbance from customers and vehicle movements, taxis etc.

Restrictions and conditions are recommended by the environmental health officer to mitigate this problem. These can be considered after all submissions have been heard.

The issue of car parking is not a relevant consideration although noise from vehicles, beeping horns, and the general social disturbance can be taken into account if members are satisfied that it is connected directly to the premises.

It is considered that the following policies are relevant to this application:

Statement of Licensing Policy

6.0 Crime & Disorder

6.6 In addition to the requirements that the Council promote the licensing objectives, it also has a duty under Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 to do all it reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder in the County Borough. The council is required therefore to have particular regard to the likely impact of licensing on crime and disorder. The nature or type of premises, its location, the hours of operation, its impact on the area, the operation and management of premises are all significant factors, which can impact on crime and disorder. All

applications for licences or certificates including renewals and variations will be expected to have addressed these matters within the operating schedule.

6.9 The Council considers that certain types of premises are likely to require additional measures or conditions due to the nature, type and mode of operation. These would include premises, which sell alcohol and cater mainly for the 16-25 age group and provide regulated entertainment, or premises which provide events or entertainment mainly for children.

In order to ensure the safety of patrons and other persons in the vicinity of the premises, the council suggests that operating schedules give consideration to the following measures and may require any or all of these measures to be implemented in the interests of minimising crime and disorder.

(i) Door Supervisors

The need for door supervisors is normally a matter, which is considered and determined by the applicant within the operating schedule. However, where an applicant has made no provision for providing door supervisors, but it is considered that they are essential to meet the crime and disorder or public safety objective the council may specify that the premises must provide registered door supervisors. The council may also require a duty log / register of door supervisors be kept for the premises. Where door supervisors are provided they must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority. Generally one door supervisor per 100 persons would be required to be present on the premises. However, additional supervisors may be necessary in certain situation, e.g. where there is a significant number of very young persons, or where there is a potential for boisterous or excitable behaviour, e.g. stag nights; football matches; celebrity visits. Applicants are advised to give consideration to these matters within the operating schedule as well as the days and hours of operation of the door supervisors.

(ii) CCTV

The provision of CCTV is a very useful tool in monitoring premises to assist in ensuring the safety of patrons and preventing crime and disorder. The council may specify that a suitable system approved by the police and council, covering the interior and exterior of the premises, is installed. This should be

properly maintained and fully operational whilst the premises are open. The areas to be covered should normally be entrances, both external and internal and any part of the premises not routinely under visual supervision including beer gardens. CCTV tapes should be kept for twenty-eight days and made available to the police and local authority officers at any time.

(iii) Glasses/Bottles

Applicants should, where appropriate be able to demonstrate that they have adequate procedures in place to prevent glasses and bottles being brought into or out of the premises, and there is provision for regular collection of glasses and bottles. The use of toughened drinking vessels and plastic bottles should be considered. Where the consumption of alcohol is likely to be in the open air, e.g. in beer gardens or outside events, toughened or plastic vessels should be used.

7.0 Public Safety

- 7.5 Certain types of premises, due to the nature of activities being provided, may give rise to a significant risk if occupancy numbers are not set. The council following representations will consider setting occupancy limits particularly in respect of the following types of premises:
 - (i) night clubs/public houses providing regulated entertainment (ii) theatres
 - (iii) cinemas
 - (iv) any other premises where the authority is satisfied that the nature and operation of the premises is such that it requires regulation of numbers at the premises.
- 7.6 The council following representations may also impose occupancy limits when it considers it appropriate for other reasons, e.g. to minimise crime and disorder.

8.3 The Council may require applicants for premises licences to provide documented noise assessments with a view to minimizing noise nuisance.

- 8.5 In premises where regulated entertainment is provided, the licensing authority will require a documented noise assessment for the premises, which must indicate whether there is likely to be any nuisance or disturbance to the local community, and if so, what measures are to be implemented to prevent this.
- 8.6 The licensing authority may at its discretion waive the requirement for a noise assessment where it can be demonstrated that the nature, type or location of the premises is such that the likelihood of nuisance arising is negligible.

Public Safety

7.34 "Safe capacities" should only be imposed where necessary for the promotion of public safety or the prevention of disorder on the relevant premises. For example, if a fire certificate for certain premises includes certain conditions, it would be unnecessary to reproduce them in a premises licence. Indeed, it would be wrong to lay down conditions which produce conflict with other legal requirements. However, if the fire certificate has been granted for premises when their future use for a licensable activity was not known, the fire authority may consider it necessary for a new capacity to be attached to the premises which would apply at any material time when the licensable activities are taking place and make representations to that effect. In considering the representations, licensing authorities should give particular weight to those made by the fire authority in such circumstances. Capacities attached to premises licences or club premises certificates may in certain circumstances be necessary in preventing disorder, as overcrowded venues can increase the risks of disorder as crowds become frustrated and hostile.

1.28. Officer's Report

Crime and disorder and public safety form the basis of police representations.

The location of the premises in the main late night area of the town means that there is a significant level of disorder in the area already. The hours of operation are questioned in view of this. Also requirements relating to public safety are proposed in view of the type of premises. The environmental health officer expresses concern about the public nuisance objective and proposes that no additional hours be approved.

All recommendations by the police and environmental health officer should be considered in the light of any proposals submissions made by the applicant.

Since we opened NRG is June 2004, we have been successful in attracting the right type of clientele. In the evenings, we attract a mature crowd of clientele.

1.34 Promotion of Licensing Objectives

The following information has been provided by the applicant:

General - all four licensing objectives:

On a day to day basis, Julie or myself are at the buisness premises to oversee the running of the business. Julie will become the designated premises supervisor post November 2005, I strongly feel that we have developed a competent team of staff who are aware and appreciate licensing laws and the four underlying objectives. It is our intention to obtain personal licenses for three of our full-time staff within the next 6-9 months. We are a member of the Neath Pub Watch Scheme and are vigilant licensee's with

regards to under-age and responsible drinking. We have recently installed CCTV within our premises as a deterrent against

anti-social behaviour. We do not have 'Happy Hours' or drink promotions as our main seller is wine.

The Prevention of Crime & Disorder:

I consider that we operate our business in Neath in a professional and responsible manner.

Our staff are well trained and responsible.

CCTV camera's are fitted throughour the premises which is saved onto hard-disc for 28 days plus. The exterior of the premises are covered by the council's CCTV.

As a member of the Neath Pub Watch scheme we have a pager located near the till for all staff to hear in the event of an incident in Neath. This has proved to be very successful too for us. Being a little away from the main pubs, we do not attract the younger drinkers into our establishment, we attract a mature and responsible crowd.

Staff on duty understand and are vigilant of the licensing laws and will always ask for photo ID if in doubt of age. Staff do not serve intoxicated customers and are also vigilant of drug abuse.

Public Safety:

Being a fairly new business, we underwent numerous visits by Health & Safety, the Fire Department prior to our opening in June 2004. We operate a strict no-smoking policy throughout the premises. Staff are cautious when it comes to Health & Safety and fire exits are never blocked. We are aware of the hazards of overcrowding the premises and the main emergency exit is never blocked. All equipment purchased new in summer 2004 is currently being PAT tested. Fire notices are well appointed within the premises. Fire fighting equipment is maintained and checked regularly. The CCTV help with the monitoring of the whole premise as the whole area can be viewed via a monitor in the kitchen.

The Prevention of Public Nuisance:

Since we opened, we have had no occasions when music has been loud to cause any public nuisance. We have, and we will not serve intoxicated customers within the premises. The evening trade is very relaxed and comfortable with low music whilst people dine. We do not plan to have loud music or offer karaoke at NRG. In the evening, we normally close the front door around 21:00 hours. I propose that our external lighting is switched off at 24:00 hours in the future if we are granted our licence until 03:00 hours. Taxis who pick up do not generally 'hoot' as they can be seen and are visable to us when they pull up. Shortly I will put up a sign asking people to leave the premises quietly in the evening.

The Protection of Children from Harm:

To date, we have not had any under-age drinking problems at NRG. Our staff are vigilant to the under-age drinking problems in the town centre and if they are in doubt they would request photo ID. Shortly, we will put up signs confirming that we would ask for proof of age if in doubt. Due to our non-smoking policy and our prices, we have not attracted the younger clientele. Our average customer in the evenings is in their 30's. Teenagers do visit NRG on Saturdays and during holidays with their friends but we are mindful of this as we are a licensed establishment. In the evening, children occasionally come with their parents, but we do make it clear that our childrens licence allows them only until 21:00 hours.

- 8.4 Noise from amplified music is a common source of disturbance. In order to minimise the impact in the vicinity, the licensing authority may require a range of measures to be taken. These may include the installation of soundproofing, air conditioning, acoustic and sound limitation devices.

from simple mechanisms like ensuring that doors and windows are kept closed after a particular time in the evening to more sophisticated mechanisms like sound level inhibitors on amplification equipment or sound proofing. Any conditions necessary to promote the prevention of public nuisance should be tailored to the style and characteristics of premises and the type of activities expected to take place there.

- 7.42 As with all conditions, it will be clear that conditions relating to noise nuisance may in certain circumstances not be necessary where the provisions of the Environmental Protection Act 1990 and of the Noise Act 1996 adequately protect those living in the vicinity of the premises in question. But as stated earlier in this Guidance, the approach of licensing authorities and responsible authorities should be one of prevention and when their powers are engaged, licensing authorities should be aware of the fact that other legislation may not adequately cover concerns raised in relevant representations and additional conditions may be necessary.
- 7.43 Where applications have given rise to representations, any necessary and appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. For example, music noise from premises usually occurs from mid-evening until either late evening or early morning when residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise may also prove necessary to address any disturbance anticipated as customers enter and leave the premises and therefore, in the immediate vicinity of the premises.

1.37. Officer's Report

Representations from the environmental health officer refer to excessive opening hours and recommeds that there be restricted to prevent disorder.

Also in respect of live music, restrictions are proposed to minimise noise nuisance.

The planning officer also makes representation with regard to a planning restriction on the hours of operation. Members will need to assess whether this impacts on the objectives and if it should be taken into account.
