Report Title - Third Sector Grant Funding - Award of Grants for 2023/24

Purpose of Report

1. To present Members with the outcome of the third sector grant applications for 2023/24 and to seek approval on the award of grants to those organisations recommended for funding in next financial year as set out in Appendix 1 and Appendix 3.

Executive Summary

- 2. Assessments were undertaken for a total of 64 applications received this year as set out in the attached Appendices.
- 3. The applications were assessed by the Third Sector Grants Group, whose membership is made up of Directorate representatives already involved in the grant funding process and are responsible for the administration of the Scheme.
- 4. Appendix 2 contains those organisations not recommended for funding.
- 5. Appendix 3 contains the 4 Strategic Partners their proposed grant amount for 2023/24.

Background

6. The application process for 2023/24 grant funding opened on 8th August 2022 and closed on 14th October 2022.

- 7. Grants awarded under the Scheme are for 12 months or for a maximum of three years.
- 8. The grants which have been provided for three years are to partners the Council has previously identified as Strategic Partners.

Monitoring Arrangements

- 9. All single year grant recipients for 2023/24 are required to submit evidence of outcomes and performance achieved by end of January 2024.
- 10. The 3 year grant recipients are required to submit evidence of outcomes and performance every 6 months.

Assessment of Grant Applications for 2023/24

- 11. Those applications that are recommended for approval in Appendix 1 and 3 have satisfied some or all of the criteria contained within Principle 1 of the revised Scheme.
- 12. The value of applications was significantly higher that the approved budget. Where organisations have previously received monies an uplift of approximately 5% has been given. New applicants have been awarded an allocation of the third sector grant budget, which may be a lower amount than requested which may result in scaled back activities.

Financial Appraisal

- 13. Cabinet have previously approved a funding allocation of £586,000 for the third sector grant scheme in 2023/24. The total value of successful applications as set out in Appendix 1.
- 14. All grants payable are subject to successful delivery of outcomes as set out in the application forms / final grant offer letters and agreed by the Council with each applicant.

Integrated Impact Assessment

15. An Equality Impact Assessment was completed as part of the initial development of the Grant Scheme in 2016 and a further Integrated Impact Assessment was completed as part of the changes to the

- Scheme in 2018. The Scheme was reviewed further in July 2022 with only minor amendments made.
- 16. All applications have been considered in alignment with the current Scheme and therefore no further assessment is required.

Valleys Communities Impact:

17. Some of the applications will be delivering projects to support valley communities.

Workforce Impact

18. There is no workforce impact.

Legal Impact

19. All successful grant recipients will be required to sign a Grant Agreement.

Risk Management

20. The successful grant recipients will assist the Council to provide important services within the County Borough or specific areas.

Consultation

21. There is no requirement for external consultation on this item.
